We have 5 boys and 10 grandchildren. I stay busy with family, church activities and shopping!






Homer Houston Bass [Reita]Cookeville, TN

Sylvia and I divorced in 2004, and I retired from Exxon at about the same time in order to spend more time with my mother who had been diagnosed with cancer. I stay busy in


retirement with consulting and volunteer work. I still like to travel and do so as often as the budget will permit.



I thank the Lord for keeping me alive at the present time!



JSCC I enrolled in Union University and obtained a Bachelor of Accounting in 1979.





Auburn University getting her vet degree). Our oldest grandchild has her nurse practitioner license and is practicing at Vanderbilt.











According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics consumer price index, today's prices in 2019 are 748.16% higher than average prices throughout 1962. The dollar experienced an average inflation rate of 3.82% per year during this period, meaning the real value of a dollar decreased.

In other words, \$1 in 1962 is equivalent in purchasing power to about \$8.48 in 2019, a difference of \$7.48 over 57 years.
