Ellisburg, Jan. 3.—James N. Smith, a veteran of the Civil war, died at his home north of this village Tuesday at 7 p.m., after an illness of a week's duration, although he had been in failing health for a long time.

He was the son of Solomon and Betsey Smith and the last one of his family to pass away. He was born July 20, 1848. He was twice married, his first wife being Jennie Hicks, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Barnett Hicks, who died in 1875. His second wife was Olive Abbott, who died June 14, 1886. He is survived by one daughter, Mrs.

H. S. Cronk, with whom he resided.

The funeral services will be held at his late home Friday at 1 p.m., and he will be buried in the family lot in the cemetery here. 1912.

union was a most happy one and the home life ideal.



He moved to the state of Washington, going to Golden about 1892. He was a master carpenter and expert boatbuilder, and helped construct many of the well known passenger steam boats on the Golden-Windemere, Columbia river route, from the second "Duchess" onward. As a prospector, he discovered some prominent mineral properties and he worked on the old Bobbie Burns gold claims at the time the stamp mill was in operation in 1892.
